HABS Creates Animation and Virtual Tour of Historic Ellis Island Hospital

Starting in the summer of 2014 the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) produced documentation of the Historic Ellis Island Hospital complex, part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument. The documentation consists of measured drawings, large-format photographs and a historical report for the HABS/HAER/HALS Collection in the Library of Congress.

HABS utilized a high-definition laser scanner, in addition to hand-drawn field notes, and hand-measuring to obtain information needed to produce existing conditions measured drawings of the hospital buildings. <u>Read more.</u>







Information is now available online for the 2016 competitions sponsored by the Heritage Documentation Programs (HDP) of the National Park Service. HDP administers the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS), the Federal Government's oldest preservation program, and its companion programs: the Historic American Engineering Record (HAER) and the Historic American Landscapes Survey (HALS). Documentation produced through HABS/HAER/HALS constitutes the nation's largest archive of historic architectural, engineering, and landscape documentation.

There are four competitions:

The Charles E. Peterson Prize is awarded to the best sets of measured drawings prepared by student teams of a HABS site.

The Kenneth L. Anderson Prize, an adjunct to the Peterson Prize, is awarded to the best set of measured drawings prepared by a student team from a university in Texas.

The Leicester B. Holland Prize, open to both students and professionals, is awarded to the best single-sheet measured drawing of a HABS, HAER, or HALS site.


The HALS Challenge, open to everyone, awards prizes for documentation of our nation's cultural landscapes.



HABS Creates Animation and Virtual Tour of Historic Ellis Island Hospital

Starting in the summer of 2014 the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) produced documentation of the Historic Ellis Island Hospital complex, part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument. The documentation consists of measured drawings, large-format photographs and a historical report for the HABS/HAER/HALS Collection in the Library of Congress. HABS utilized a high-definition laser scanner, in addition to hand-drawn field notes, and handmeasuring to obtain information needed to produce existing conditions measured drawings of the hospital buildings.

The animated fly-through video of the Main Hospital Building is comprised of data from more than 180 individual laser scan stations, combined and textured with HDR panoramic photograph data. The rendering of more than 1.7 billion data points was done using Pointools point cloud animation software.

This digital tour provides "access" to a portion of Ellis Island that is typically not open to the public. Located on portions of the island that were created in the early 20th century the hospitals housed the U.S. Public Health Service.

APT Renewing Modernism Symposium

The 2015 APT Annual Conference held in Kansas City, MO November 1-5, featured a symposium on Renewing Modernism that brought leading scholars, officials and practitioners from around the world together for an intensive one day working session to discuss emerging trends in addressing modern heritage and to draft consensus "Principles for Practice." Sponsored by the APT Technical Committees on Modern Heritage and Sustainable Preservation, the event was keynoted by Wessel de Jonge, a Dutch Architect and co-founder of DOCOMOMO International, and the sessions articulated a range of issues and needs such as differences between traditional and modern era buildings that raise philosophical challenges in applying traditional conservation approaches to repair or replacement decisions, and the need for improved consistency in expectations regarding appropriate treatment. Particular attention was given to how the profession should address buildings of widely varying character, merit and integrity, and to what degree the "modernization" that is so often desired particularly by owners of second and third tier modern structures can be accommodated - both from a design and a technical perspective - without loss of essential character.

The accommodation of change was also considered as part of the practical need to evaluate individual buildings within a broader framework for sustainable town and urban planning, and the growing need to achieve sustainable rehabilitation and adaptive use of buildings of the Modern Movement. In particular, there was a focus upon the unique challenges that Modern buildings pose with respect to improving energy efficiency, reducing carbon load, increasing durability and resilience, and generally integrating sustainable solutions for buildings that were designed during an era of cheap fuel, and widespread industrialization of buildings and their components, which often included relatively experimental of untested materials and assemblies.

The Symposium featured eleven speakers in three plenary sessions - the first on Resource Evaluation and Assessment, the second on Performance Metrics, and a third on Holistic Solutions for Sustainable Preservation. We closed with a lively panel discussion that featured all of the speakers and a lot of audience participation - which was expertly stimulated and managed by David Woodcock, FAIA. The Committee is in the process of drafting the principles for practice, and is preparing materials for publication in multiple journals. Links will be provided to this material as it becomes available.

Preservation50 - Celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the National Historic Preservation Act

Historic preservationists across the country have geared up for Preservation50—a nationwide commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the passage of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). Preservation50 is engaging federal and state agencies and national, tribal, and statewide preservation organizations. Private sector leaders in preservation are essential partners and collaborators at all stages of the Preservation50 effort, from planning, to funding, to program execution.

Preservation50 is managed by Cultural Heritage Partners, PLLC, a Washington, DC headquartered international law, policy, and business strategy firm. Greg Werkheiser, Co-founder of Cultural Heritage Partners and Director of the Management Team of Preservation50 shared some of the background and objectives of Preservation50.

Everybody knows that much has been accomplished in the past 50 years, but historic preservation as a movement needs to continue to evolve over the next 50 years to attract new stakeholders without which the movement will not be viable. We are working to provide opportunities and programs that will appeal to a broad spectrum of people and organizations and find ways to increase synergy and collaboration. A key objective is to build unexpected partnerships and deploy these around unexpected programs.

Preservation50 includes direct programming at the national level and strategic support for programming at the tribal, state, and grassroots levels. The National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers serves as fiscal agent for Preservation50's \$3 million budget. Mission

Preservation 50 has five goals. They were derived by consulting leaders in the field and the public, and refined over the last two years.

Goal 1: Build the coalition required to power a more effective preservation movement.

Unite partners across sectors in the largest, most diverse, and most collaborative coalition in history.

Goal 2: Learn from the first 50 years of NHPA to plan preservation's stronger future.

Organize discussions of critical topics that connect lessons learned with new strategies.

Goal 3: Tell the story to a broad range of Americans of heritage preservation's value.

Use social, digital, and traditional media to reveal impacts in ways visual, savvy, and inclusive.

Goal 4: Educate policymakers about improving heritage policy and funding.

Lay the groundwork for greater credibility and influence in subsequent years.


Goal 5: Prepare the heritage preservation movement's future leaders.
