Course Description


Our justice system is beginning to implement responses to social deviance that are more humane, efficient and effective. Evaluating metrics of public safety, environmental impact, economic factors, preparedness for unplanned events, and restorative justice principles can increase long-term success. The Restorative Justice Visioning Event will demonstrate how to pursue objectives that best support sustainable, resilient communities and maximize the potential of individuals.

This event will seek input from organizations such as Miami-Dade County Commissioners; project administration; local government leadership; environmental specialists; representatives from the Sea Level Rise Task Force; AIA Disaster Assistance Task Force, community interest groups; urban planners, national justice design experts; and restorative justice advocates including our Friday breakfast plenary partner, DreamCorps.

The Visioning Event program is presented in three parts and is intended to be cumulative, although attendees are welcome to attend any/all sessions.



Revitalizing an Urban Center

- Broad development for Miami to add value to the future of Miami
- Rare opportunity to connect approximately 15 acres to engage civic
- Unique for such diverse components to converge
- Redefines Miami
- A great example of sustainable justice.

The potential development includes but is not limited to:

- Consolidation of major court functions and elimination of the Pre-Trial Jail (DCPTDF)
- Jackson Memorial Hospital Development
- Mahi Future River Landing Mixed Use Development
- Opportunity to incorporate public and rapid rail transportation and weave pedestrian and small scale
- "Urban Scale" affordable housing






- Several public safety master plans over four decades
- Resulted in two new correctional facilities and a new children's courthouse. Future general obligation bonds require waiting period
- Alternative financing would expedite development





Miami-Dade County Pretrial Detention Facility (DCPTF)


Proposed solution to demolish building and move to an alternate location and replace with Courthouse holding.
