### **Course Description**



Multiple states have enacted Juvenile Justice Reform, decreasing the numbers of juvenile offenders housed in secure facilities; yet at the same time, creating a change in the profile of the juvenile offender. Jurisdictions are housing juveniles with increased mental health needs; that if left untreated, results in violent, predatory and aggressive behavior. This has created an environment where juveniles and staff are at risk, existing facilities are outdated, and tried and true design strategies are being challenged.

The presentation encourages an open discussion between users, judges, past juvenile offenders, architects and planners on programming, staffing, and design strategies, that can address the needs of the "new" juvenile offender in a safe & secure, yet normative environment.






# Less Incarceration More Treatment


As a new report finds secure facilities inherently flawed and dangerous,
