

What is a livable community?



A livable community is one that is safe and secure, has affordable and appropriate housing and transportation options, and offers supportive community features and services.

Once in place, those resources enhance personal independence; allow residents to age in place; and foster residents' engagement in the community's civic, economic, and social life.

They are for all people of all ages.







HOW TO USE THE INDEX



Beyond the AARP Livability Index



A county executive and staff want to know how to meet the housing needs of the growing older adult population.



A real estate agent wants to market his walkable community as a place to find great housing near many local businesses and other amenities.



A non-profit organization wants to show the need for transportation services in the community.



A community advocate wants to make the streets safer for those who cannot afford to drive and those who can no longer drive.



An AARP member is deciding between two locations and wants to live close to medical services because she is taking care of a family member.

What can the AARP Livability Index do for your community?



Example: Design Professional

Helen, architect and small-scale developer



- Helen is an architect and is working with several clients in a new community and wants to know more about the housing stock in the area
- In searching the AARP Livability Index website, Helen looked at the Housing category and found that a little more than half of the homes are likely to have at least one zero-step entryway.
- Helen also noticed that there are state or local laws in place to support inclusive design of homes.
- With this information, in addition to addressing her clients' preferences for new features in their homes, she's going to also talk to them about changes that they can include to make their homes safer and more comfortable as they age.








- Use the Index to spur conversations with community members about the importance of creating livable communities through “data stories”
- Highlight the connection between Index Categories and NAFSC domains
 - Community needs assessments
 - Establish baseline data
 - Secondary assessments (census data, index data, research)
- Share insights about current community conditions and policies that impact community livability
